Survey Methodology

NOV. 8 2022–DEC. 5, 2022

10 COUNTRIES

- 6,569 Interviews with randomly selected adult citizens
- Combination of cell phone and landline interviews
- ~500 nationally representative interviews in 8 countries
- 1,000 nationally representative interviews in Russia and Ukraine

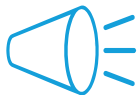

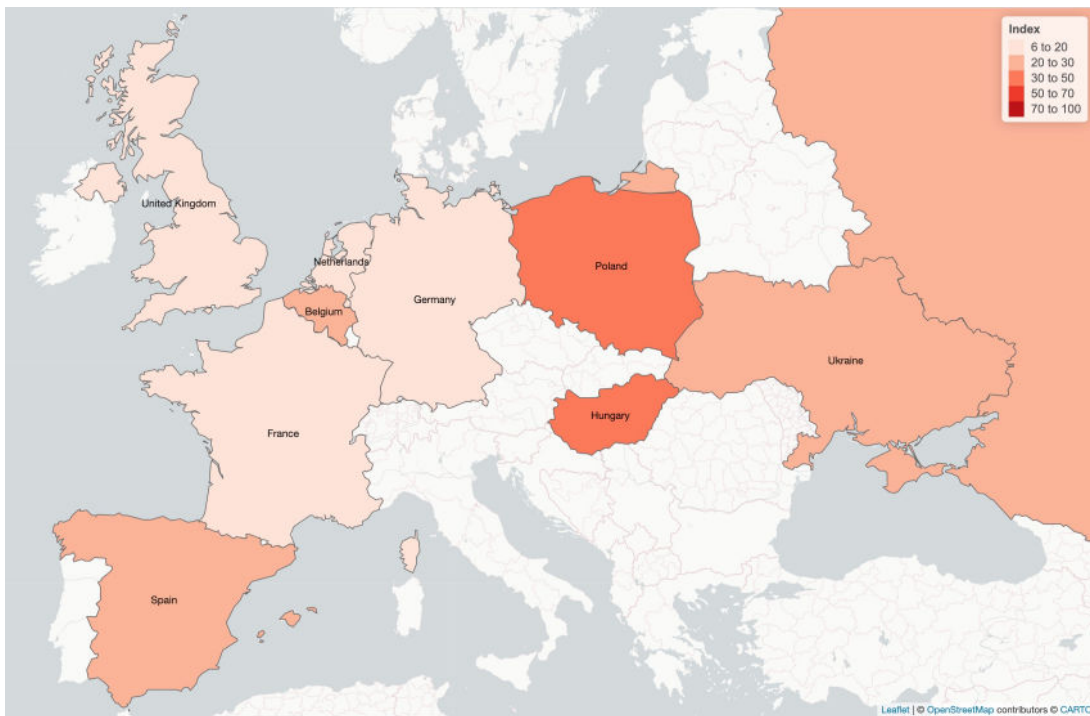

Major Findings

Index Scores are stable in most countries but have decreased in Ukraine and a few other countries.

No real change in Index Score since last survey



Belgium, France,
Germany, Netherlands,
Spain, UK

Any 5+ point DECREASE in Index Score since last survey



Ukraine (-17)
Poland (-13)
Hungary (-5)
Russia (-5)

While the Poland score (35%) is lower than 2019 (48%), its consistent with 2015 (37%)

Major Findings

Even in countries with relatively low Index Scores, like the Netherlands, there are significant numbers of people who harbor antisemitic opinions. In larger countries, index scores can translate to tens of millions of people.

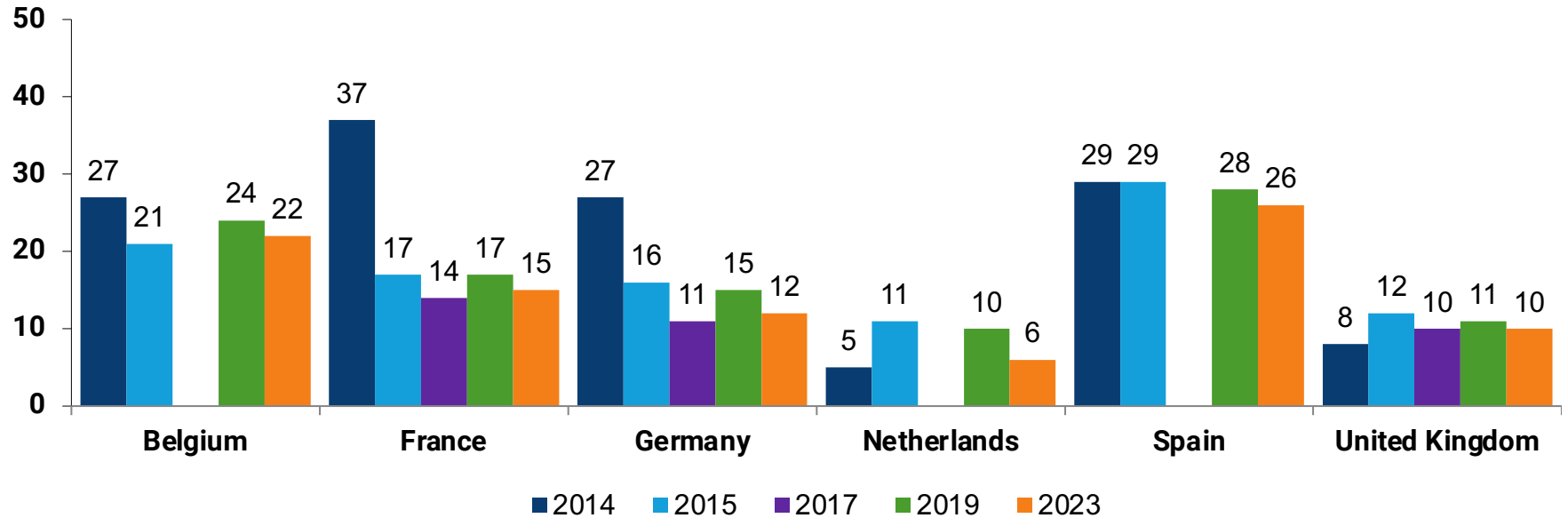

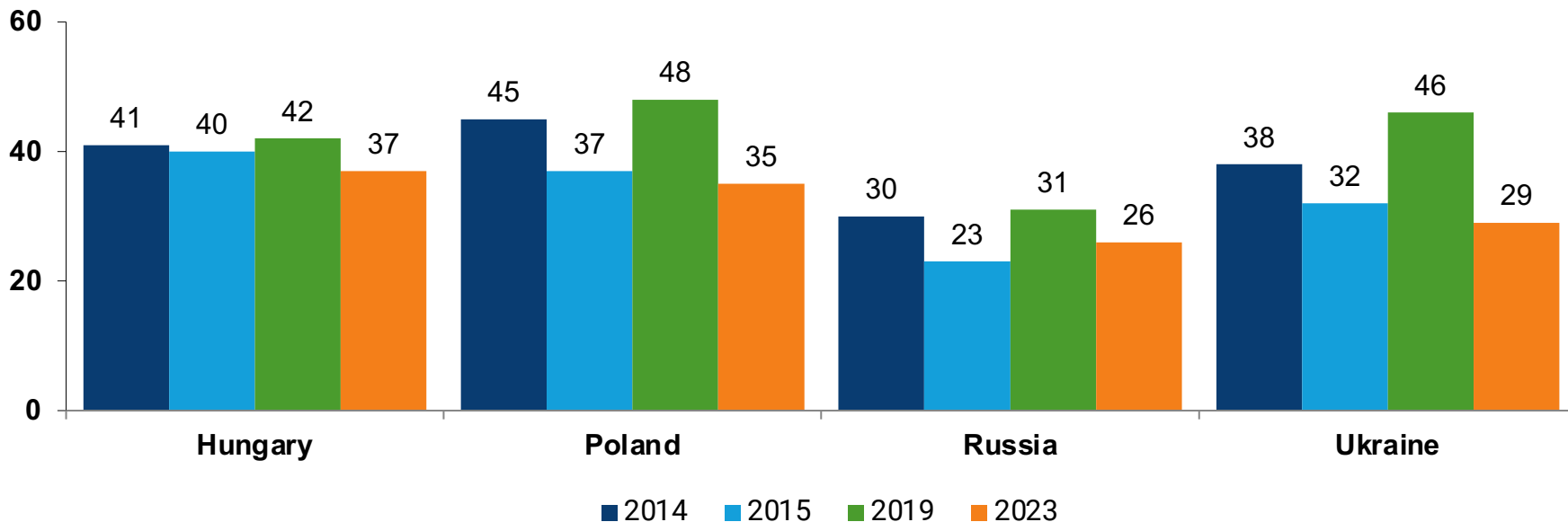
Index Scores have remained considerably steady across Western Europe

Index Score: Western Europe



In Eastern Europe, Index Scores are down in Ukraine and Poland, though comparable with previous polls in both

Index Score: Eastern Europe



Major Findings

The lowest Index Score we have measured in Ukraine

Ukraine, which has elected a Jewish President and rallied against invasion since our last wave, has a lower Index Score

This is the lowest Index Score we have measured in Ukraine, and follows a spike in 2019

Political antisemitism is at the lowest level measured in Ukraine.

Index of Antisemitic Attitudes

Antisemitic Stereotypes

Major Findings

Political antisemitism is the most common stereotype across Western Europe. In Eastern Europe, we also see economic antisemitism and the perception of Jews as clannish as the most commonly held stereotypes.

Major Findings: Significant antisemitic prejudices even in countries with low index scores

While the trajectory in Index Scores is mixed in Europe, significant percentages still agree with harmful stereotypes. For example, there is significant political and economic antisemitism in the countries with the lowest Index Scores.

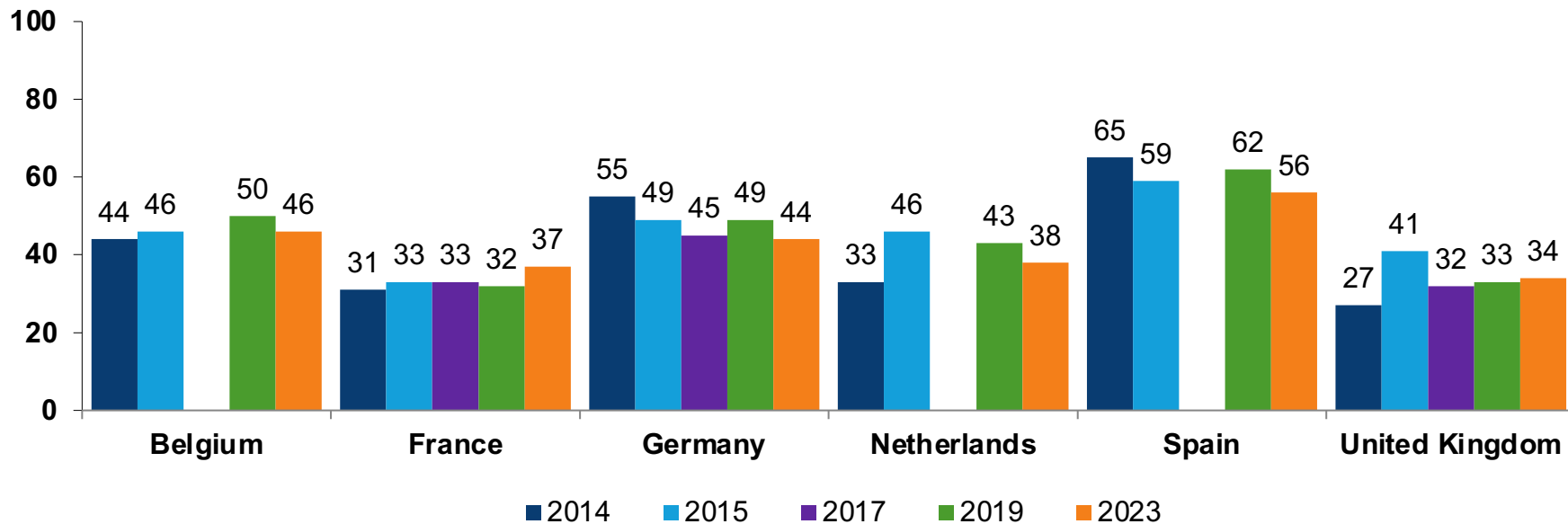

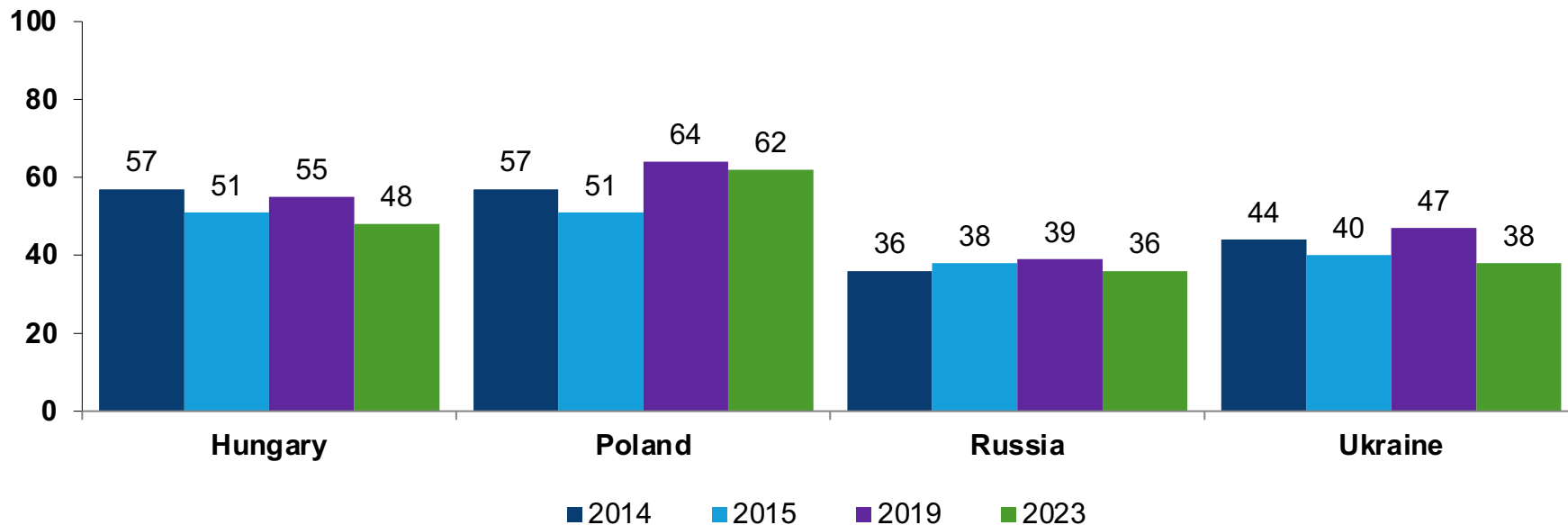

Major Findings: We see antisemitism across the political spectrum in Europe (though higher on the right)

In Europe, Index Scores tend to be higher on the political right than the political left, but there are a significant number who harbor antisemitic views across the political spectrum.

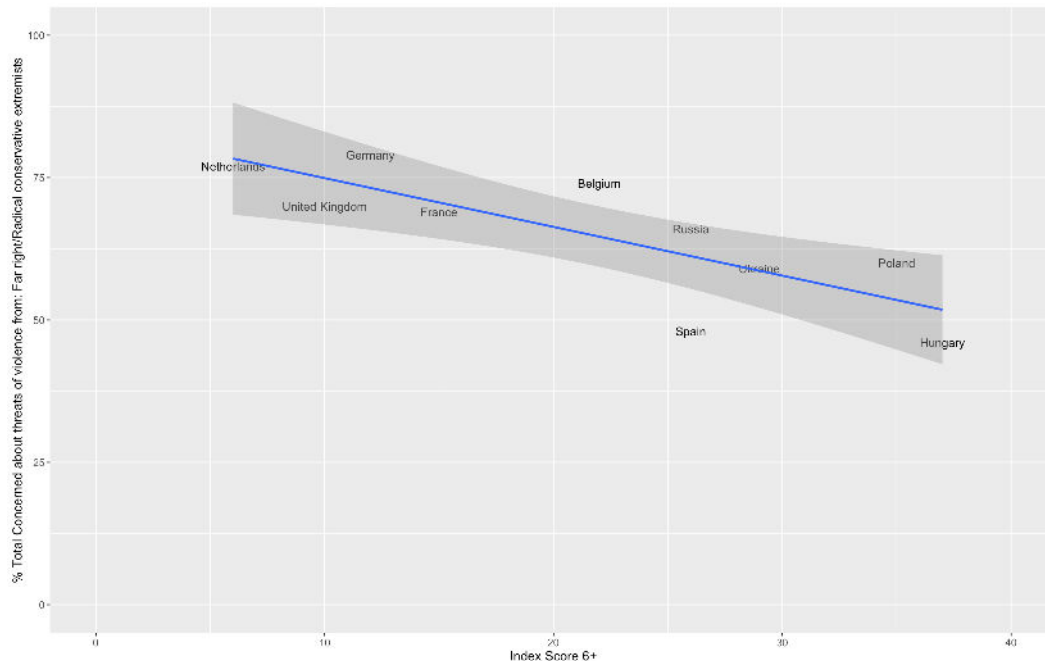

Major Findings: High concern in Western Europe over right-wing violence

There is high concern over right wing violence in Western Europe. Countries with more concern about far-right violence tend to have lower Index Scores.

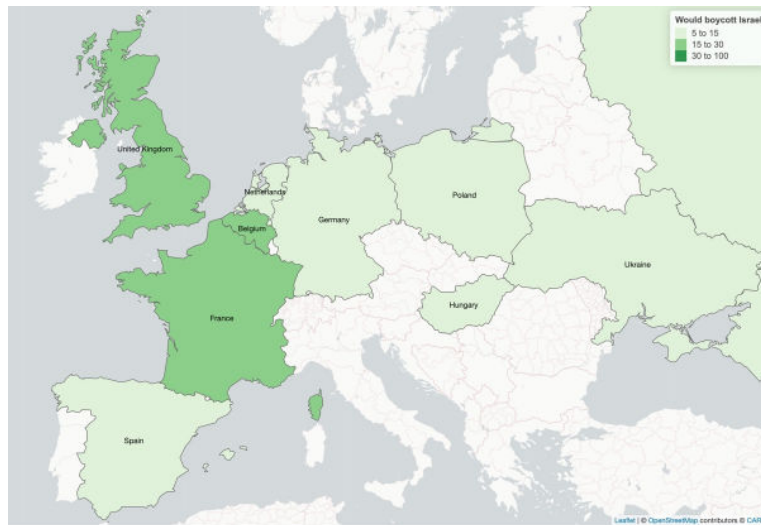
Countries further to the top have higher concern over right-wing violence.

Countries further to the right have higher Index Scores.



Major Findings: Opposition to BDS across Europe

While many Western European countries say they sympathize more with Palestinians than Israelis, support for boycotting Israel is very low.

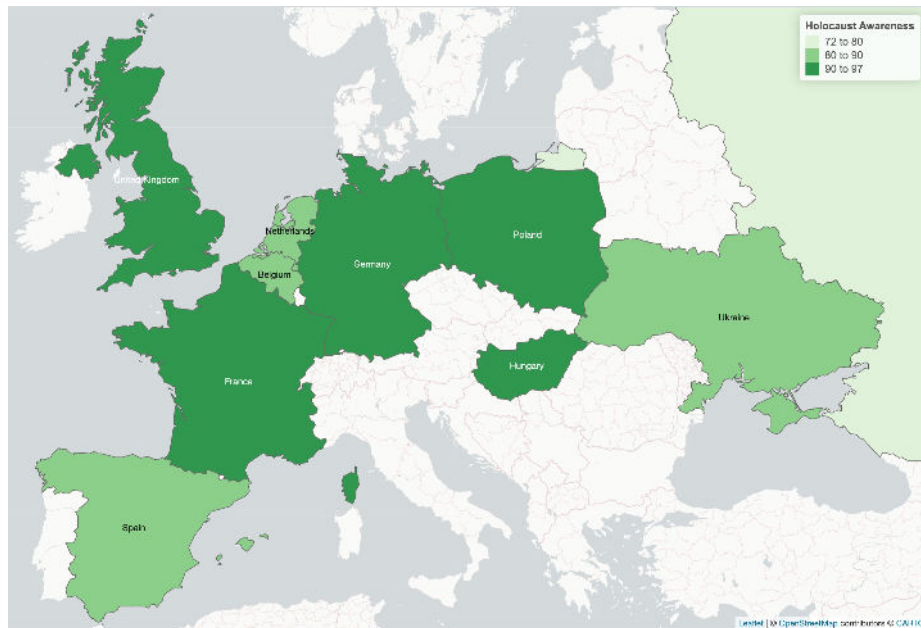

Holocaust awareness is virtually universal across Europe

Denial is higher in Eastern than Western Europe, and in Western Europe is generally low across the board.
